Food Is Free Albuquerque had its start in sheer astonishment.

The astonishment of the abundant fruit, the generosity of strangers, and the need for a community. We were well-meaning volunteers, determined to make a difference in the grassroots of Albuquerque.

The past eight years have brought changes and sidequests. 2020 offered the most significant opportunities and growth for FIFABQ. We saw the need in our neighborhoods and have responded. We have grown into the city's most impactful gleaning organization, **providing over 400,000 servings of fresh food to our community.**


Consistently found in the top ranks for food insecurity, lowest per capita income, and drought-impacted, New Mexico is an ideal location to demonstrate the impacts of gleaning. An estimated 1+ million pounds of fresh food grows annually in the yards of Greater Albuquerque Area residents. Most of this valuable commodity is wasted. With fresh foods being one of the most requested items from food distribution organizations, gleaning helps fill this niche by providing local in-season produce.

Over the past eight years, this community-powered gleaning program has **redistributed 85,000+ pounds of backyard produce**. Originally started by two moms, their kids, and laundry baskets, FIFABQ has grown into a community fixture entrusted by homeowners, farmers, and organizations. Demand for services has exploded. Volunteer registrations increased by 700%+. Harvest calendars were booked six weeks out. Since 2020, 52,000+ pounds were harvested and distributed, making up 61% of the combined eight years.

FIFABQ's audacious goal is for Albuquerque to become the first city to utilize 100% of its human-edible, locally-grown produce within its community. While it will take several years to accomplish, we are not daunted. We are inspired.

We extend our greatest gratitude to all who have gotten us here and redefined the power of commUnity.

















OUR 2022 GOALS

1

Create Better Systems

Program success is built upon good systems. This covers everything from volunteer management, to program flows, and backend support.

FIFABQ better developed how our harvesting program works. Our booking system was streamlined to make it easier for our homeowners to schedule a harvest and for volunteers to be involved in these opportunities.

These improvements kept our harvesting calendars full weeks in advance and engaged 350+ volunteers.

3

Further Organizational Education

In order to grow, we needed to grow our minds. Thanks to a generous grant from CNM, we gained knowledge in human resources and management, as well as a deeper understanding of digital marketing. These topics were part of the CNM Ingenuity Program and strengthened foundational practices for our nonprofit. Likewise, thanks to another grant from the Association of Gleaning Organizations, our Leadership could attend the International Gleaning Symposium, where organizations, lawmakers, and activists nationwide build the bridge between food waste and hunger on a national level.

Hire Lead Harvesters

This goal was lofty. FIFABQ had not had the opportunity to staff and pay Lead Harvesters. Until 2022, our Leads were purely volunteers who assisted in their free time, with our main harvester being our Executive Director, Erin. Thanks to the City of Albuquerque & Honeywell Food is Free ABQ was able to hire 3 Lead Harvesters for the 2022 season. These Leads have been with FIFABQ for a while - a few from the beginning. Anni, Samuel, and Kate allowed harvesting calendars to provide ample opportunities to our community and homeowners. We were able to accommodate the commUnity better than ever before

Our organization only succeeds when we connect with our commUnity. This ranges from our dedicated volunteers to landowners, policymakers, and other local organizations and businesses.


2022 opened the door to conversations with our city policymakers, allowing FIFABQ to build programming within Coming Nuove



According to the EPA, food waste produces methane, a harmful greenhouse gas 25 times more potent than CO2.

Globally, food waste contributes to over 8% of total greenhouse gas emissions, a large contributor to climate change.

In 2022, 351 volunteers were engaged in commUnity efforts - from our Annual Seed Share to our Seasonal Harvesting Program.


Our volunteers contributed to the 786 hours our organization spent harvesting in our efforts to reduce food insecurity.
